What is Public Health Nursing?

Public health nursing is the practice of promoting and protecting the health of populations using knowledge from nursing, social, and public health sciences.

Public health nursing is population-focused with the goals of promoting health and prevention of disease and disability for all people through the creation of conditions in which people can be healthy. (American Public Health Association, 1996)

APHN Focus

The primary focus of public health nursing is to promote health and prevent disease for entire population groups. Training prepares our nurses to be able to implement efforts in:

- Force health protection and readiness
- Health promotion and primary prevention
- Population assessment and epidemiology
- Data-based program and policy development

APHN Scope of Practice

- Under the core functions of public health, assesses health conditions and potential threats, develops policies to protect and preserve health, and assures the health and safety of the community.
- Advises command on issues of medical readiness, and health threats and conditions of military importance to promote, protect, optimize, and preserve the health of the Total Force.
- Recommends countermeasures and strategies to prevent, control, and minimize non-battle injuries and diseases in support of Force Health Protection in both garrison and deployed environments.
- Operates within the 10 Essential Public Health Services guidelines at the tactical and operational levels.

APHN Missions

- Kamenge Military Hospital in Bujumbura, Burundi: APHN led Ebola response classes and Ebola preparedness exercises in support of Combined Joint Task Force - Horn of Africa.
