

HOUSEHOLD SHARPS DISPOSAL



The following is general guidance

What are Household Medical Sharps?


- Syringes, hypodermic needles, scalpel blades, and lancets.
- Potential health risk to waste collectors.

What should I do with my sharps?

- Off-post: follow local (state or county) requirements. On-post: contact your environmental office.
- Place waste sharps in a rigid, puncture-resistant container with a secure lid or screw-on cap. For example, empty detergent bottles work well.
- Do not overfill the container. Nothing should protrude from the top causing possible injury.
- When full, tighten the lid and secure it with tape. Using a permanent marker, label containers destined for disposal with the words "Waste Sharps."
- Place the sealed container in the trash or as directed.

What should I NOT do?

- NEVER add bleach to your sharps container. Bleach could spill or injure waste handlers.
- NEVER shear, clip, bend, re-cap, or break needles, as this increases the risk of a needle-stick injury.
- NEVER put sharps loosely in the trash.
- NEVER discard the sharps container into the recycling waste stream.
